We'll gladly accept them, but they must be in good condition; clean, no tears and no mould.



New suburb signage for MacMasters Beach

Council will be installing a new suburb sign in MacMasters Beach on The Scenic Rd, near the RFS sign near Doyle St. Here's an example of what to expect, but with MacMasters Beach on it, not Towoon Bay!

The sign's location is determined based on factors including existing suburb signage location, traffic volumes, proximity to the suburb boundaries, underground utility locations and line of sight for traffic and pedestrians.

Our sign is part of Council's rollout of standardised suburb signage across the LGA.

Local voices on Council's 'Lagoons Community Reference Group'

In our last Newsletter, we reported that Council has established a Community Reference Group to seek input from the community about the future management of the four Coastal Lagoons - Wamberal, Terrigal, Avoca and our own Cockrone. They will assist in the development of the Coastal Lagoons Coastal Management Program (CMP).

We reported three residents had joined that Group. What we didn't know was that three other community members have also joined, including Ben McDonnel and Shelley Van den Hooven (famous for her fabulous photos of birdlife on the lagoon).

The Group's first meeting showed that our Cockrone Lagoon has many friends from Copacabana and Kincumber as well as Macs, so it is well represented in the Group's deliberations.

While each lagoon is unique, they share many of the same issues. We have asked that these common concerns as well as the unique aspects are factored into the planning process. The basis on which Council must open the lagoons, known as the "let-out policy" was the most controversial. We hope that an improved and better communicated policy is one of the outcomes of the Group's participation in the process.

Bushcare

Allelopathy – Lantana's fiendish survival strategy

Ever wondered why Lantana is such a bad weed? Why is it one of the 32 plants on Australia's Weeds of National Significance, making it among the worst of the worst? Why is it so successful at taking over native vegetation in over 60 countries?

Lantana comes from Brazil, loves our climate, and has no natural enemies here. So it thrives – a lot!

And its fiendish, secret survival strategy is Allelopathy! That's the ability of a plant to poison the soil around it, so other plants can't thrive. So quite simply, Lantana poisons its competitors. Any seed from a local native that germinates near Lantana is quickly snuffed out by its toxin, and the Lantana dominates. We said it was fiendish!!

Removing Lantana removes the toxin and allows natural germination to take place and the land can start to rehabilitate itself. That's why bush regeneration actually works.

Smaller Lantana can be pulled out, larger Lantana is best cut off near the ground with loppers or a bush saw and herbicide quickly applied to the stump with a small paint brush to kill the roots, a technique known as 'cut and paint'. Then follow-up a few months later. It has to die!!
